Dear Parents and Guardians of Students Entering 3rd Grade:

Required Summer Reading/Writing

St. Jude Regional Catholic School believes that summer reading is a valuable experience for all students and an important extension of our educational programs. Therefore, students entering third grade must:

- Read three books from the attached list or from www.Reading-Rewards.com. One book must be fiction, one non-fiction and the third book can be either fiction or non-fiction.
- Complete the attached book reports. Additional pages may be added. They may also type the
 book reports. If the book reports are typed, they do not need to be typed on the form and the
 questions do not need to be retyped. Reports will be collected the day the students return to
 school in September. All reports will be graded and counted as quiz grades.

Some of the books are more difficult to read than others. When choosing a book, have your child turn to the middle and read two or three pages. If there are as many as five or more words that your child doesn't know the meaning of or can't pronounce then the book is probably too difficult. If your child can read the pages easily then he/she will most likely enjoy reading the entire book.

Dr. Benjamin's Summer Reading Challenge!

Challenge! Did you say challenge? Dr. Benjamin has again issued a reading challenge to all the students entering 3rd through 8th grades. If these students read 100,000 minutes (20 minutes a day for each student) between now and the beginning of school he will do something outrageous! Also, the top three readers will receive a gift certificate. The minutes will be totaled using the students' Reading Reward minutes. So read a lot and log those reading minutes into www.Reading-Rewards.com!

The required reading counts towards the Summer Reading Challenge. All books read for the Summer Reading Challenge must come from the 3rd grade Summer Reading List at www.Reading-Rewards.com or be pre-approved by Mrs. Richter. If the student wants to read a book that is not on the list, please email Mrs. Richter at Maureen.Richter@StJudeRockville.org for approval prior to reading the book.

Abbott, Tony The Secrets of Droon (series)

Eric, Julie, and Neal, a trio of best friends from our world stumble upon the magical world of Droon, a realm populated by wizards and sorcerers and full of strange landscapes.

Avi Poppy

Poppy the deer mouse urges her family to move next to a field of corn big enough to feed them all forever, but Mr. Ocax, a terrifying owl, has other ideas. (For advanced readers)

Bauer, Marion Dane. The Blue Ghost

Nine-year-old Liz is helping her grandmother prepare to sell the old family cabin. She is awakened at night by a strange blue light and a voice calling her name. In the corner of her room, a ghostly woman dressed in old-fashioned clothes beckons to her and then disappears through the wall. Later, Liz hears voices and a baby's cry coming from behind the spot where the blue ghost vanished. She follows the sound and finds herself in the same cabin but long ago when it was first built.

Blume, Judy Freckle Juice

Andrew wants freckles so badly that he buys Sharon's special freckle recipe for fifty cents. He carefully begins to mix the strange combination of ingredients and immediately runs into some unforeseen problems.

Bowen, Fred *On the Line* (or any AllStar Sports Story book by Fred Bowen)

Worried that his inability to make free throws is making his junior high basketball team lose games, Marcus learns an unconventional underhand shooting method from a friendly custodian but is not sure he wants to use it.

Bulla, Clyde Robert The Chalk Box Kid

Nine-year-old Gregory's new house does not have room for a garden, but he creates a surprising and very different garden as a mural on an abandoned factory wall which the classmates at his new school come to see.

Ann Cameron Gloria's Way

Gloria is best friends with Julian and his little brother Huey, and she has as much to say as they do. There's the parrot that ruins the Valentine for her mother; Huey's dog, who needs to be cured of his squirrel obsession; and what happens when classmate Latisha tricks Gloria, Julian, and Huey-but they don't know until it's too late!

Carris, Joan Welcome to the Bed and Biscuit

Mini-pig Ernest, mynah bird Gabby, and Milly the cat help Grampa Bender in his day-to-day chores at the Bed and Biscuit, a friendly animal shelter. When Grampa begins spending all of his time with a sick Scottie pup, the other animals, particularly Milly, feel jealous. When she vanishes, it's up to Ernest and Gabby to find their friend and convince her that even though there's a new member of the family, Grampa doesn't love her any less.

Byars, Betsy Tornado

As they wait out a tornado in their storm cellar, a family listens to their farmhand tell stories about the dog that was blown into his life by another tornado when he was a boy.

Christopher, Matt *The Hit-Away Kid* (or any Matt Christopher book)

Barry McGee, hit-away batter for the Peach Street Mudders, enjoys winning so much that he has a tendency to bend the rules; then the dirty tactics of the pitcher on a rival team give him a new perspective on sports ethics. (For advanced readers)

Cleary, Beverly Henry Huggins

Henry wants some excitement in his life. Excitement arrives in the form of a skinny stray dog that befriends Henry at the drugstore. Boy and pooch bond instantly when Henry offers his ice cream cone to the dog, who downs it in one gulp. Henry calls his four-legged pal Ribsy, for obvious reasons, and with more than a little effort and confusion, brings the lovable pet home to his family's house on Klickitat Street. (For advanced readers)

Clements, Andrew Jake Drake, Bully Buster

When Jake was three years old at Miss Lulu's Dainty Diaper Day Care Center, what did he know about bullies? Nothing! But he learned fast! Why? Because Jake is kind of smart, and he's not a tattletale, and he doesn't have a big brother to protect him.

DiCamillo, Kate Mercy Watson to the Rescue

Mercy is a fat little pig and a beloved member of the Watson family. When Mr. and Mrs. Watson sing her a happy morning song, she feels as warm inside as buttered toast. But when the lights go off, Mercy is so scared she gets in bed with the Watsons. The bed breaks under the weight, which leads to a series of hysterical events.

DiCamillo, Kate Flora and Ulysses: The Illuminated Adventure

It begins, as the best superhero stories do, with a tragic accident that has unexpected consequences. The squirrel never saw the vacuum cleaner coming, but self-described cynic Flora Belle Buckman, who has read every issue of the comic book *Terrible Things Can Happen to You!*, is the just the right person to step in and save him. Springtime has arrived at Silverlake Forest! Sophie Mouse can't wait to go back to school after the long winter break. Even better, there's a new student in class—Sophie loves meeting new animals! But the class gasps when Owen enters: he's a snake! No one is brave enough to sit near him, or play with Owen at recess, or even talk to him. Can Sophie help her friends understand that Owen's not scary after all?

Hale, Shannon The Princess in Black

Who says princesses don't wear black? When trouble raises its blue monster head, Princess Magnolia ditches her flouncy dresses and becomes the Princess in Black!

Princess Magnolia is having hot chocolate and scones with Duchess Wigtower when . . . Brring! Brring! The monster alarm! A big blue monster is threatening the goats! Stopping monsters is no job for dainty Princess Magnolia. But luckily Princess Magnolia has a secret —she's also the Princess in Black, and stopping monsters is the perfect job for her!

Hanlon, Abby Dory Fantasmagory

As the youngest in her family, Dory really wants attention, and more than anything she wants her brother and sister to play with her. But she's too much of a baby for them. Her siblings may roll their eyes at her childish games, but Dory has lots of things to do: outsmarting the monsters all over the house, escaping from prison (aka time-out), and exacting revenge on her sister's favorite doll. And when they really need her, daring Dory will prove her bravery, and finally get exactly what she has been looking for.

Harper, Charise Just Grace

Misnamed by her teacher, seven-year-old Grace prides herself on being empathetic, but when she tries to help a neighbor feel better, her good intentions backfire.

Henkes, Kevin The Year of Billy Miller

When Billy Miller has a mishap at the statue of the Jolly Green Giant at the end of summer vacation, he ends up with a big lump on his head. What a way to start second grade, with a lump on your head! As the year goes by, though, Billy figures out how to navigate elementary school, how to appreciate his little sister, and how to be a more grown up and responsible member of the family.

Howe, Deborah and James Bunnicula: A Rabbit-Tale of Mystery

Though scoffed at by Harold the dog, Chester the cat tries to warn his human family that their foundling baby bunny must be a vampire. (For advanced readers)

Kelly, Katy Lucy Rose, Here's the Thing about Me

Eight-year-old Lucy Rose keeps a diary of her first year in Washington, D.C., her home since her parent's separation, where she spends time with her grandparents, makes new friends, and longs to convince her teacher to let her take care of the class pet during a holiday.

Kerrin, Jessica Scott Martin Bridge Ready for Takeoff!

Meet Martin Bridge -- a boy whose well-meant plans sometimes go awry. In three illustrated stories, Martin encounters two bus drivers with very different ways of relating, makes a tough decision about a friend's pet and takes on an extremely competitive model rocket project.

Le Guin, Ursula K. Catwings

Four young cats with wings leave the city slums in search of a safe place to live, finally meeting two children with kind hands.

Maclachlan, Patricia Arthur, For the Very First Time

Arthur spends a summer with his unconventional aunt and uncle and begins to look at life, his family, and himself differently.

MacDonald, Megan Stink: The Incredible Shrinking Kid (any in this series)

James ("Stink") Moody is the shortest kid in his second-grade class. Is he shrinking? Judy is his bossy older sister, but he learns to handle her. For Presidents' Day, Stink's hero is not big tall Lincoln but another James, James Madison, the shortest president ever.

McKay, Hilary Lulu And The Duck In The Park

Everyone knows that no pets are allowed in school, but an egg is not a pet is it? See what happens when Lulu brings an egg to school.

Park, Barbara Junie B. Jones and a Little Monkey Business

It's pooey on B-A-B-I-E-S until Junie B. finds out that her new dumb old baby brother is a big fat deal. Her two bestest friends are giving her everything they own just to see him. And guess what else? Maybe she can bring him to school on Pet Day.

Peterson, John *The Littles* (or any of *The Littles* series)

The Littles, a family of six-inch high people who live in the walls of an old house, begin to worry when the new residents bring a cat.

Estes, Eleanor The Hundred Dresses

None of her classmates pay much attention to Wanda Petronski, a Polish-American girl, until she announces she has 100 dresses in her closet. Everyone laughs and teases her so much that she stops coming to school. Then, her classmates discover she really does have 100 dresses and discover something about teasing and themselves.

Rodowsky, Colby F. Not My Dog

Eight-year-old Ellie wants a puppy. So, she is not happy when her parents tell her they are adopting a full-grown dog belonging to a distant relative. But, gradually the brown, skinny-tailed dog with sticking-up ears wins her over. (For advanced readers)

Roy, Ron A to Z Mysteries (any in this series)

Not only does Dink Duncan like to read mystery books, he also likes to solve crimes in real life. Along with his two best friends, Josh and Ruth Rose, Dink unravels mysteries in his hometown of Green Lawn, Connecticut-and sometimes far away from home, too, at places like a dude ranch in Montana and a castle in Maine. Follow the clues along with Dink and his friends on each of their adventures!

Schlitz, Laura Amy The Night Fairy

Flory loses her wings after a bat attack and struggles to adapt to life as a day fairy.

Scieszka, Jon *Knights of the Kitchen Table* (any in this series)

When Joe gets a magic book from his uncle, he and his friends find themselves transported to King Arthur's court.

Sobol, Donald J. *Encyclopedia Brown, Boy Detective* (any in this series)

Ten-year-old Leroy Brown, son of the police chief of Idaville, opens a detective agency and before the summer is over solves nine baffling cases, the solutions to which are found in the back of the book.

Spinelli, Jerry The Library Card

The lives of four young people in different circumstances are changed by their encounters with books.

Spinelli, Jerry Third Grade Angels

"First grade babies! / Second grade cats! / Third grade angels! / Fourth grade rats!," Given a challenge by their teacher, Suds and his third grade classmates are now out to prove who is the top angel in the class.

Stilton, Geronimo (any in this series)

Warner, Gertrude Chandler The Boxcar Children (any in this series)

Edwards, Roberta Who Was King Tut?

Ms. Edwards explains the life and times of this ancient Egyptian ruler, covering the story of the tomb's discovery, as well as myths and so-called mummy curses.

Gare, Thompson Who Was Helen Keller?

At age two, Helen Keller became deaf and blind. She lived in a world of silence and darkness and she spent the rest of her life struggling to break through it. But with the help of teacher Annie Sullivan, Helen learned to read, write, and do many amazing things.

Herman, Gail Who Was Jackie Robinson?

As a kid, Jackie Robinson loved sports. He was a natural at football, basketball, and, of course, baseball. But beyond athletic skill, it was his strength of character that secured his place in sports history. Getting started on Reading Rewards!

Dear Parents and Guardians.

Your child has been set up on Reading Rewards.

GETTING STARTED ON READING REWARDS

- 1. Go to https://app.reading-rewards.com
- 2. Click on the Log In link.
- 3. Enter in your username (hint: your 1st initial and last name, you may need your middle initial, or graduation year) and password (Upper case first initial of your last name and your student ID/Scantron number number).
- 4. Click on Booklist:
 - scroll down and click on Recommended Book Lists
- 5. What kind of book lists would you like displayed
 - Click on List Compiled for Your Group
- 6. Select a book list to display
 - Select book list from your current grade (grades 5th 7th have a Required Book list and a Reading Challenge list)
- 7. Click on cover of book for more details about the book. Once you have decided on a book to read. Get this book from your public library, Barnes and Noble, or from Amazon.
- 8. Go back up to top tabs and Click on Reading
- 9. Click on the My Reading Log tab.
- 10. Select a book from the drop down list
- 11. Enter your reading date and time. Every time you read, enter the number of minutes you read into Log Reading Time!
- 12. Click SAVE
- 13. That's it! You have logged your reading time. If you said you finished your book, you will be asked to review it. Doing so gives you bonus RR Miles!
- 14. Your account requires validation by a parent or guardian; they will get an email asking them to validate your reading. Make sure they check their spam folder and add notifications@reading---rewards.com to their contacts!
- 15. Students entering 5th and 6th grades must go to Quizzes tab and click on the quiz for their grade.
 - All questions must be answered on the website.
